

IRANIAN STUDENTS CLINCH GOLD MEDALS IN ISIF 2025



Iranian students have secured three gold medals and a special award in the International Science and Invention Fair (ISIF) 2025, ranking them among the top innovators worldwide.

Organized by the Indonesian Young Scientist Association (IYSA), the competition was held in Bali from November 12 to 15.

Iranian students competed in various fields, including biotechnology, educational technology, artificial intelligence, mathematics, engineering, chemistry, and nanotechnology.

Raman Nafarieh won a gold medal and a special award in biotechnology. The team, comprising Radin Abbasi and Sam Rashidi, clinched a gold medal in engineering. Moreover, Matin Hayati won a gold medal in educational technology and artificial intelligence.

The ISIF 2025 brought together a total of 800 teams from 24 countries, including China, the U.S., Mexico, South Korea, Taiwan, Canada, Turkey, Luxembourg, Indonesia, and Vietnam.

Iran grabbed five gold medals and two special awards in the ISIF 2024.

IRANIAN, UZBEK UNIVERSITIES AIM TO EXPAND HEALTH CO-OP

Shiraz University of Medical Sciences and Tashkent State Medical University have explored ways to enhance scientific, research, and educational cooperation, as well as health tourism between the two universities.

An Iranian delegation led by Hossein-Ali Amiri, the governor general of Fars province, paid a visit to Tashkent, Uzbekistan. The delegation visited Tashkent State Medical University, hospitals, and universities in Termez and Surkhandarya, as well as pharmaceutical and food industry companies, and clinics.

During a meeting between the chancellor of Shiraz University of Medical Sciences, Seyyed Basir Hashemi, and the chancellor of Tashkent State Medical University, Shukhrat Boymurodov, the two sides agreed on fostering collaborative efforts through conducting specialized courses for faculty members and medical staff, organizing short-term and long-term internships, as well as summer and winter training courses for students.

BURKINA FASO SEEKS IRAN'S EXPERTISE IN COMBATING DRUGS



Burkina Faso's Security Minister Mahamadou Sana has voiced the country's willingness to benefit from Iran's anti-narcotics police expertise in the fight against drugs.

He voiced Burkina Faso's readiness for the expansion of collaborations with Iran in different sectors, particularly sharing experiences and knowledge, as well as providing laboratory equipment and drug detection dogs.

Sana made the remarks in a meeting with Iran's antinarcotics police chief, Iraj Kakavand. The official met on the sidelines of the 22nd International Exhibition of Police Security and Safety Supplies and Equipment (IPAS), held from October 13 to 16.

For his part, Kakavand said that a decisive and targeted fight against drugs is a demanding task requiring actions that go beyond national and regional boundaries.

There will be no positive results and success unless all countries take effective steps to confront drug trafficking decisively through boosting their cooperation, he added.

TAJIK ENVOY CALLS FOR ESTABLISHING JOINT SCIENTIFIC COMMITTEE WITH IRAN

Tajikistan's ambassador to Iran, Nizamuddin Zahedi, has underlined the need for the establishment of a joint scientific committee between the two countries.

Referring to the expansion of relations between Iran and Tajikistan within recent years, Zahedi said collaborative efforts in educational fields can be further expanded through resuming scholarships to attract more Tajik students and developing a joint scientific committee to hold regular meetings and come up with solutions to benefit from the optimal capacities of the two countries.

The Tajik official made the remarks in a meeting on Tuesday with Saeed Habiba, the head of the Organization of Student Affairs.

He also proposed exchanging students to improve the quality of education and facilitate learning the Persian language for Tajiks.

For his part, Habiba highlighted cultural, linguistic, and historical commonalities between Iran and Tajikistan, saying that science diplomacy is the most effective means to promote scientific cooperation with Tajikistan.

IRAN, KUWAIT SIGN 5-POINT DEAL TO BOOST TRADE COOPERATION



Iran and Kuwait have signed a five-point agreement to expand trade and investment following the 13th Joint Trade Committee meeting in Kuwait, held after an 11-year pause, according to the Trade Promotion Organization of Iran (TPO).

Abdolamir Rabihavi, TPO's director general for West Asia, said the meeting — held on November 4–5 and chaired by Mohammad Ali Dehqan Dehnavi, Iran's deputy minister of industry, mine and trade and head of TPO — concluded with "constructive and forward-looking results."

He noted that Kuwait's proximity to Iran and short sea routes between Abadan, Khorramshahr, and Kuwaiti ports, along with a land connection via Shalamcheh, offer strong logistical advantages.

With \$38 billion in annual imports, Kuwait could serve as a promising market for Iranian products, he noted.

As reported, the two countries signed agreements in trade and investment, food security, industry and standards, customs, and transportation.

IRAN, UZBEKISTAN AGREE TO EXPAND INVESTMENT IN MINING INDUSTRIES



Iran and Uzbekistan have reached new agreements to strengthen trade and investment cooperation, particularly in mining and mineral industries, the Iranian Ministry of Industry, Mine and Trade announced.

During a meeting in Tashkent, Iran's Minister of Industry, Mining and Trade Seyed Mohammad Atabak held talks with Uzbekistan's Minister of Mining and Geology and the Minister of Investment, Industry and Trade. Both sides underlined the importance of expanding industrial collaboration and mutual investment.


Atabak said the new agreements "pave the way for a major leap in the level of trade and business relations between the two countries," adding that despite the upward trend in cooperation, both nations must achieve the ambitious targets set by their presidents.

The Iranian delegation, including senior officials from the trade and mining sectors, traveled to Uzbekistan on November 9 to pursue new tariff arrangements, ease customs procedures, and promote industrial partnerships.

ABOLFAZL BEYHAQI: THE FATHER OF PERSIAN PROSE




Abolfaz Beyhaqi was born in the village of Harethabad in Beyhaq (currently known as Sabzevar, north of Iran), Khorasan province, Iran. His father facilitated his move to Neyshaboor to study in the major cultural center of the city. He later on moved to Ghazni when he was still a young man. Beyhaghi's special authorship skills persuaded Abu Nasr Moshkan (a minister during the reigns of both Mahmood of Ghazni and his son, Masood) to bring him to Ghazni to work as a secretary and a writer. He was known to be a trustworthy person, and had an exquisite handwriting. Beyhaqi gradually became Abu Nasr's confidant, and got the chance to receive information pertaining to the Empire. At the same time, he had begun writing the book Tarikh-e Bayhaqi.

Tarikh-e Beyhaqi

Tarikh-e Beyhaqi (History of Beyhaqi) is indeed one of the greatest works in the history of Persian literature, and among the few surviving Farsi books of the pre-Mongol era. Despite its old style of writing, the book continues to attract readers. Beyhaqi started writing it in 1056. It has 30 volumes, and talks about the events during the 42 years of the Ghaznavid rule. The first four volumes contain the same content as the one in Tarikh-e Montazam-e Naseri and Tarikh-e Yamini. Volume 5 - some of earlier pages of which have been destroyed - to volume 10 of the book are still available as well as the rest of the volumes basically discuss the events in the year 1059. There are a number of factors that make Tarikh-e Beyhaqi unique. The named book is a history book, and commits to the principles of historiography, including accuracy and sincerity in recording historical events. In addition, the author reveals the historical details in an artistic manner, reflects a multidimensional perspective towards those events. The original name of Tarikh-e Beyhaqi is "Tarikh-e Naseri". It is also known as "Tarikh-e Ale Naser", "Tarikh-e Ale Sabooktigin", "Jame' al-Tawarikh" and "Jame' fi Tarikh Sabooktigin". Some scholars call it "Tarikh-e Mas'udi" because the remaining volumes of the book are dedicated to the events that happened during Masood of Ghazni's reign.

Father of Persian Prose

Unlike what was quite common, B—yhaqi refused to bow down to the kings, warned them about their shortcomings and recorded the history without fear. He had sharp eyes for historical events, analyzed them scientifically, and did not shy away from criticizing the rulers. Historians unanimously argue that the social, and at times the geographical analysis of the historical events in Tarikh-e Beyhaqi indicate that B—yhaqi was more than just a historian.

The book is filled with illuminating quotes, enlightening stories, meaningful advices and wise recommendations. Because of the use of literary techniques and rhetoric and its rhythmic prose, it is not only a source for history of literature, but also a good source of classic Persian literature. The mentioned traits convinced the literary community to call Beyhaqi "the father of Persian prose". His style of prose was highly influenced by his master,

Abu Nasr .shkanخخM Some of the notable characteristics of yhaqi's ث prose are: 1) Reintroduction of screed, contrary to the essayistic style of the time, without compromising on fluency and accuracy 2) Artistic expression of details, in a way that keeps the reader interested about the events, and eager to continue reading 3) Use of quotations and allegory 4) Exemplary grammatical structure, and 5) Use of common Persian proverbs of the time.

B-yhaqi narrated historical events and individuals' reactions like a story-teller, which have mad Tarikh-e B-yhaqi emerge as an interesting book of history to the readers.

Demise

B-yhaqi passed away in 1077 at the age of 85. He lived for 19 more years after he finished Tarikh-e Beyhaqi, and kept updating the book with new content throughout the last 19 years of his life.

IRAN, OMAN MOVE TO ACCELERATE PTA IMPLEMENTATION, SIGN INDUSTRIAL COMMITTEE MOU



Iran and Oman have agreed to accelerate the implementation of their preferential trade agreement and expand industrial cooperation through a newly formed bilateral industrial committee, according to Iran's Trade Promotion Organization (TPO).

During a recent visit to Muscat, Mohammad-Ali Dehqan Dehnavi, head of the TPO and deputy minister of industry, mining and trade, met with Qais bin Mohammed al-Yousef, Oman's minister of commerce, industry and investment promotion. The two sides underlined the need to speed up the trade pact's execution, organize a joint economic commission, and hold a business forum in Tehran to introduce investment opportunities in Oman.

According to Abdolamir Rabihavi, TPO's directorgeneral for West Asia, both countries also discussed drafting and finalizing the industrial committee memorandum of understanding (MOU), which was signed by deputy ministers from Iran and Oman.

IRAN-PAKISTAN BUSINESS FORUM HELD IN KARACHI

During a visit to Pakistan, Mohammad Bagher Qalibaf, the speaker of the Iranian parliament (Majlis), and Mohammad-Ali Dehghan Dehnavi, the Iranian deputy minister of industry, mining and trade and the head of Iran's Trade Promotion Organization (TPO), met with some traders and businessmen and emphasized issues such as the development of commercial cooperation and accelerating the free trade process between the two countries.

Iran-Pakistan business forum was held in Karachi, with the presence of Qalibaf and Dehghan Dehnavi, along with the extensive participation of Pakistani traders and businessmen.

At this meeting, topics such as the development of commercial cooperation and accelerating free trade with Pakistan were emphasized.

Also, during this trip, Dehghan Dehnavi met and held talks with Faiz Ahmed, the Chairman of the Trade Development Authority of Pakistan (TDAP). Topics discussed in this meeting included free trade, removing obstacles and problems in bilateral trade relations, reviewing borders and border markets, and facilitating the customs processes of the two countries.



ANAR BIJ – MEATBALLS IN POMEGRANATE AND HERB SAUCE




